SACRAMENTO KINGS: Draft rights (38th overall in the 2009 NBA Draft) acquired by Sacramento along with guard Sergio Rodriguez and cash considerations from Portland in exchange for the draft rights to Jeff Pendergraph (31st overall, 2009 NBA Draft) ... Signed a contract with the Kings (9/15/09) ... Is the fifth player in franchise history to don #40 (last was Kevin Gamble, 1996-98) ... Second UW big man chosen in the previous three NBA Drafts (Spencer Hawes, 2007) ... Fifth player from Washington taken in the draft since 2005, joining Hawes, Brandon Roy (sixth overall, 2006), Bobby Jones (37th overall, 2006), and Martell Webster (sixth overall, 2005) ... **2009 NBA Summer League:** Averaged 5.4 ppg (.409 FG%, .450 FT%), 9.2 rpg, and 1.2 apg in five games (started four) for the Kings contingent ... Ranked fifth in the league in rebounding ... Led team in rebounding in two games ... Recorded a game-high 12 rebounds, seven points (2-6 FG, 3-8 FT), and one assist in 22 minutes vs. Milwaukee (7/13) ... Corralled a game-best 15 rebounds vs. New York (7/17).

2008-09 REGULAR SEASON: Named a First-Team All-Pac-10 selection and recipient of the Chip Hilton Player of the Year Award, conferred to the nation's top player demonstrating outstanding character, leadership, and athletic talent ... Also earned Third-Team All-American honors by FoxSports.com, Honorable Mention All-America by the Associated Press and CollegeHoops.net, and an All-District selection by the NABC, Basketball Times, and USBWA ... Honored as a 2009 Tom Hansen Medal Winner, bestowed to Pac-10 Conference athletes that exhibit the greatest combination of performance and achievement in scholarship, athletics, and leadership ... Voted the UW team MVP and presented with the Harshman Award for the fourth consecutive season as the leading Husky rebounder ... Earned the squad's community service award for the third straight season ... Averaged 14.9 ppg (.526 FG%, .640 FT%), 11.5 rpg, 1.1 apg, and 30.5 mpg in starting all 34 games in which he played as a senior ... Led the Pac-10 in rebounding for the third straight season and finished seventh nationally ... Recorded 18 double-doubles ... Hauled a career-high 18 rebounds on six occasions ... Tallied a season-high 30 points (11-17 FG, 8-15 FT) with 14 rebounds in season opener at Portland (11/15) ... Corralled 18 rebounds against No. 22 Kansas (11/24/08), and encored the next game with 22 points (10-14 FG, 2-4 FT) and 11 rebounds vs. No. 17 Florida (11/25/08) ... With first rebound vs. Morgan State (12/30), joined Doug Smart (1957-59) as the only players in Husky annals to surpass 1,000 career rebounds ... Grabbed 18 rebounds vs. Stanford (1/8), vs. California (1/10), against Oregon (2/14), and vs. Washington State (3/7) ... Named Pac-10 Player of the Week after guiding UW to a pair of home triumphs over Arizona and Arizona State (2/26 & 2/28) ... Snared a game-high 14 rebounds to accompany 10 points (4-8 FG, 2-5 FT) in the First Round of the NCAA Tournament vs. Mississippi State (3/19) ... Pulled down 18 rebounds and added 20 points (9-14 FG, 2-4 FT) against Purdue in the Second Round (3/21) ... Invited to participate in the Portsmouth Invitational Tournament in Virginia (4/8 - 4/11), averaging 15.3 ppg (.452 FG%, .727 FT%) and 16.3 rpg (leading all players), earning All-Tournament honors ... Corralled 21 rebounds to accompany 24 points in the first contest.

COLLEGE: Averaged 13.8 ppg (.534 FG%, .612 FT%), 9.8 rpg, 1.0 apg, and 28.7 mpg in 131 career games (started 129) over four seasons at Washington ... First player in Husky history to amass at least 1,800 career points (1,805) and 1,200 rebounds (1,283), and only player to pace UW in rebounding for four-straight seasons ... Joins UCLA legends Lew Alcindor (1967-69) and Bill Walton (1972-74) as the only players to lead the Pac-10 in rebounding for three consecutive years ... Stands alone as the Huskies all-time leading rebounder and second in scoring to Chris Welp (2,072 points between 1984-87) ... Finished career with 60 doubles-doubles ... Averaged 17.8 ppg (.536 FG%, .519 FT%), 11.6 rpg, and 1.1 apg in 32 games as a junior (2007-08), earning Second-Team All-Pac-10 and First-Team All District by Basketball Times, NABC, and the USBWA ... Led the conference in rebounding and ranked third nationally behind Michael Beasley and current Kings teammate Jason Thompson ... Recorded double-doubles in a league-leading 23 games and reached double-figures in scoring in every contest ... Named Pac-10 Player of the Week on three occasions ... Posted a career-best 31 points and matched a career-high with 18 rebounds vs. Utah (11/14/07) ... Swatted a career-high six shots against No. 16 Texas A&M (11/21/07) ... Named a First-Team All-Pac 10 selection as a sophomore (2006-07), averaging 14.2 ppg (.550 FG%, .660 FT%), 9.6 rpg, and 1.1 apg in starting all 32 games in which he played ... Scored a career-high 51 points against Stanwood (2/17/05).

SACRAMENTO KINGS: Selected by Sacramento as an early entry candidate out of Israel (Maccabi Tel Aviv) with the 23rd overall pick in the 2009 NBA Draft ... Signed a multi-year contract with the Kings (7/10/09) ... Is the 13th player in franchise history to wear jersey number 18 (last was Derek Smith in 1988-89) ... Only Israeli player ever chosen in the first round of the NBA Draft ... **2009 NBA Summer League:** Averaged 8.0 ppg (.295 FG%, .286 3pt%, .833 FT%), 4.4 rpg, 1.6 apg, and 22.4 mpg in five games (four starts) for the Kings contingent ... Scored in double-figures three times ... Registered 11 points (4-11 FG, 2-5 3pt, 1-2 FT), five rebounds, two assists, and two steals in 26 minutes vs. Golden State (7/11) ... Hauled in nine rebounds against New York (7/17).

2008-09 REGULAR SEASON: Finished fourth in voting for the FIBA European Young Men's Player of the Year Award behind Ricky Rubio (DKV Joventut), Danilo Gallinari (New York Knicks), and Kosta Koufos (Utah Jazz) ... Averaged 12.8 ppg (.647 FG%, .405 3pt%, .744 FT%), 4.6 rpg, and 1.9 apg in the Israeli Premier League over the first 19 contests ... Accrued averages of 8.8 ppg (.505 FG%, .450 3pt%, .771 FT%), 3.1 rpg, and 17.3 mpg in 16 Euroleague games.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: Starred in the junior ranks for team Hapoel in Holon, Israel before debuting professionally at the age of 17 ... Averaged 4.7 ppg (.588 FG%, .250 3pt%, .659 FT%), 2.4 rpg, and 10.3 mpg in 19 regular season games as a rookie for Maccabi Tel Aviv of the Israeli Premier League (2005-06) ... Appeared in three Euroleague postseason games, totaling two points ... Joined Hapoel Galil Elyon on-loan from Maccabi for the 2006-07 campaign, posting 11.2 ppg (.511 FG%, .479 3pt%, .706 FT%), 2.9 rpg, and 1.1 apg in 26 regular season contests ... Contributed 15.3 ppg (.586 FG%, .417 3pt%, .679 FT%), 3.2 rpg, 1.3 apg, and 1.33 spg in six EuroCup Challenge games, including a career-high 27 points vs. BK Prostějov ... Twelfth player in franchise history to don number 13 (last was Doug Christie) ... Second Memphis player in as many NBA drafts tabbed in the top-5 (Derrick Rose was first overall in 2008) ... One of 12 early entry candidates selected by Sacramento in the first round over the past 15 NBA Drafts (others – Corliss Williamson in 1995, Peja Stojakovic in 1996, Tariq Abdul-Wahad [formerly Olivier Saint-Jean] in 1997, Jason Williams in 1998, Hedo Turkoglu in 2000, Gerald Wallace in 2001, Kevin Martin in 2004, Francisco Garcia in 2005, Quincy Douby in 2006, Spencer Hawes in 2007, and Omri Casspi in 2009) ... **2009 NBA Summer League:** Averaged 22.3 ppg (.419 FG%, 2-7 3pt, .787 FT%), 6.3 rpg, 4.5 apg, 1.25 spg, and 29.6 mpg in starting all four games against NBA competition ... Came off the bench in one contest vs. the NBDL Select Team (7/15) ... Ranked 10th in the league in scoring and 11th in assists ... Scored in double-figures four times, tallied 20-plus points in two games, and reached the 30-point plateau once ... Logged one double-double ... Led the Kings contingent in scoring three times, rebounding once, and assists on four occasions ... Scored 50-plus points twice during senior season, amassing more than 3,300 points during high school career ... A consensus top-six recruit in the 2008 class and regarded as the best player by SLAM and DIME magazines ... Also rated third by HoopScoop, ESPN.com, Scout.com, and Hoopmasters.com and sixth by Rivals.com ... Featured in a documentary titled "Gunnin' For That No. 1 Spot," a film chronicling eight of the top high school players in the country during 2006, among them current NBA players Brandon Jennings (Milwaukee Bucks), Kevin Love (Minnesota T-Wolves), Michael Beasley (Miami Heat), Jerryd Bayless (Portland Trail Blazers), and current Kings teammate Donte Greene) ... Named MVP of the 2008 McDonald's All-America Game in Milwaukee (3/26/08), recording 21 points (9-15 FG), 10 rebounds, and four assists to help the East squad to a 107-102 victory over a star-studded Western team (which boasted four future First Round selections in the 2009 NBA Draft, including Jennings (Milwaukee), B.J. Also played in the 2008 Jordan Brand Classic All-American Game in New York (4/19/08), finishing with 23 points (8-15 FG, 7-9 FT), seven rebounds, four assists, and three steals—sharing MVP honors with Jennings.

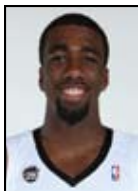
